DECODING

Easter is full of symbolism and five of these symbols cross, egg, rabbit, full moon and hot cross bun—all have a purpose in telling the story of Jesus. But what do they have to do with the death of Jesus and the good news that Jesus is alive? Why does a bunny deliver eggs and not a chicken or some other egg laying animal? It'll all make sense once you match each of the sentences with the symbol it relates to most correctly!

In April it is sometimes known as the 'Egg Moon'.

The exact date of Jesus' death and burial was not recorded at the time but we know the first Easter happened after Passover. Because Passover follows a lunar cycle, the date changes every year and so Easter changes too.







As Easter began in the Northern hemisphere it is celebrated in spring; a time of birth and new life. During spring these are laid and hatched and so

they are a powerful symbol of life.

In 1500's England spice bread was only allowed to be sold on special occasions; at burials, Christmas or Good Friday.

Nothing to do with the real Easter but a cute symbol of hope, rebirth and new life.

Each year Easter occurs on the Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon, which is the first full moon after 21 March.

In Medieval England, these were given out to the needy on special days; the cross reminded eaters of Jesus. V bunny () moon

Known to have lots of babies and so they have become a symbol of life

Sometimes rolled down hills in a celebration of the rock that was rolled away from Jesus' tomb.

People were forbidden to eat this food during Lent (40 days before Easter Sunday) and so they were a special treat on Easter Sunday.



Eaten on Good Friday the cross on top is a reminder that Jesus died so our sins can be forgiven!







In many countries it is not a 'man in the moon' but a 'hare in the moon' and so it represents the lunar cycle that sets
