Do you know your neighbours? Do you know their names, their stories, their background, their spiritual beliefs?

Where do you join God in his work?  
Work? Community? City? Hobbies?

Think about people/groups you interact with in your normal rhythm of life. Where is there an opportunity for mission in those spaces?

The goal of our church is not just to have the same people around us doing the things we like to do in our building, to selfishly keep what we have.

The goal of our church is to see the gospel spread, new people come to know Jesus and new disciples made.

The man in Mark 5 wanted to go with Jesus after he was healed but Jesus said no. Why do you think Jesus said no? What was the purpose for the man to stay in his community?

Who has made a major investment in your spiritual growth? How have they helped you become more like Christ?
