
Engagements Where have we been? ... What have we been doing?

The Melbourne Red Shield Band was formed, under the name of the Melbourne Veterans' Band in March 1982 (at the request of the then Chief Secretary, Colonel Wesley Harris) to provide music for a Senior Citizens Congress Rally organised by the Australia Southern Territory under the leadership of Envoy Richard Collett (OF). The event was to be a one off, but the band's performance proved popular and immediate requests to accept engagements commenced. In the early days, the band consisted of more than 50 members and 37 years later, still has an active schedule of events throughout the year.

It is of interest to note that 2 foundation bandsmen who performed in the Seniors Congress Rally, namely Bandmaster Fred Davies and Bandmaster Leslie Grigsbey's sons have been active bandsmen and executive band members of the MRSB for a number of years.

Bandsmen enjoy the fellowship brass banding offers and the focus is primarily missional, committed to spreading the Gospel message through the medium of sacred and inspired music under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The aim of the bands' activity and endeavour is to bring the light of hope and God's love into people's lives.

Major Gwyn Rowe is continuing to work on the website and has uploaded photos in video format, of various events and places we've visited. Have you checked it out?




